

**Public Concerns/Complaints about Instructional Resources
And Teaching Methods, Activities, or Presentations**

Instructional resources are those items designed to impart information and to stimulate thought in the teaching/learning process. Instructional resources shall include but not be limited to such items as library books and textbooks, charts, films, film-strips, games, globes, kits, maps, models, microfilms, magazines, newspapers, pamphlets, pictures, recordings, programmed materials, slides, specimens, transparencies, video tapes, workbooks, works of art and computer programs.

Teaching methods, activities , or presentations are ways in which information is introduced to the student(s).

TPCA accepts the obligation to exercise good judgment in the initial selection and continual re-evaluation of instructional resources and methods of instruction.

By their very nature, the public schools are accountable to the public. Inherent in this premise is the right of the citizenry to request reconsideration of instructional resources and methods/activities. TPCA recognizes this right and shall establish procedures for the exercise of this right.
